On Judging

Scripture: Do not judge, so that you may not be judged. For with the judgment you make you will be judged, and the measure you give will be the measure you get. Matthew 7:1-2

How often we receive the counsel "Don't judge, seek to understand." We acknowledge the wisdom of this advice. But let us be honest—we do judge.

We judge whether Mark McGwire is a better hitter and player than Sammy Sosa...and what about Ken Griffey Jr. We judge whether the Weight Watchers plan is better than Dr. Atkins' Diet Revolution plan. We judge what is best for our children and what care is best for our residents. We judge many times each day. So, what do you mean, "Do not judge!" Impossible.

A careful reading of the text suggests that Jesus' focus is not on the everyday judging which we do routinely. Rather his emphasis is about making judgments regarding the quality and worth of others. Avoid judgment that relates to the character of others. For as we judge so we will be judged.

As Christians, our judgment should be done with mercy and love. Mercy implies compassion. Love reminds us that judgment should be always for the sake of correcting or improving, rather than destroying. Never should we judge so as to serve our own self-interests. Such judgment violates love that is self-giving.

We may judge one's actions but not one's self-worth. When we seek to belittle others, the judgment is on us and our own mean spirit and littleness. So, "do not judge," but if you must, do so with mercy and love—always for the welfare of the one judged.

Prayer: Lord, may my words be spoken in love and my actions tempered with mercy. Amen.

Right out of seminary, my husband and I served the Mallory Avenue Christian Church in Portland, Oregon. The week you are reading this, there is a NBA Miracle Day scheduled there.

The years spent at Mallory taught me to expect miracles each day in the regular course of events. Lives changed when they touched that congregation. When the technician who came to install our new phone system walked through the building surveying the site he had a eye full/spirit full experience. In the basement, he met the YWCA cooking class, the kids playing ball in the gym; in the office area he met the secretary for three congregations who offered him home-baked cookies while talking with a homeless woman; upstairs he met the director of the local YWCA and a Community Minister who created programs for neighborhood families and ran a clothing bank, the two pastors, the mental health drop-in center workers and participants and the juvenile restitution officer meeting with a young community service worker. He turned to my husband, Doug, and said, "This is quite a place. I've never seen anything like it."

That is what a miracle is—a sight/happening that causes a person to stop and say, this isn't business as usual. Something different is happening here.

The men in the Mark story carried their friend to the source of healing. this week, workers from Oregon will carry the pieces of a miracle with their hands and hearts to the source of healing and a miracle will appear. The Mallory I remember was used to miracles. I expect they will smile knowingly and nod -- there is another miracle. It happens every day.

Prayer: Loving God, thank you for the miracles you bring each day. Open my heart to receive them. In expectation and hope I pray, AMEN.

A popular Rap singer, who died in 1995 at the age of 31, took pride in the profane language and violent imagery of his productions. If you listened to his music, you had the feeling that he was shaking his fist at God. It's a tragic story. All I could think of that Lenten season was what I was giving up... Everywhere I went, chocolate bunnies stared at me with surgery eyes, lying amid the brightly-colored jelly beans. They mocked me.

I felt very alone...and very, very afraid. I tried to hide my fear...even from God. I had forgotten that God already knows everything about me. I had forgotten God's offer of a hand to lead me and hold me. I had forgotten...but God had not. God kept tapping me on the shoulder and nudging me along a path to wholeness ...every once in a while, it felt like more of a push than a nudge...But God has never forgotten me.

What I gave up was nothing compared to what I gained. Each time I struggle, each time I triumph, my memory of God's abiding and unconditional love grows stronger. And, I am forgetting more and more what I have chosen to give up. This year, not one single chocolate bunny even gave me a glance!

Prayer: O God, keep reminding me when I forget your love for me. Amen

Mrs. Calloway downplays what she does and gives God the glory.
